Pastor's Letter May 2025

Brothers and sisters in Christ,

Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

As we continue in this Easter season, I want to consider the question: How can we have confidence that Christ, indeed, is risen from the dead? Scripture offers a number of important answers to this question. Here are a few.

We would be remiss if we did not begin by considering 1 Corinthians 15, St. Paul's great Resurrection chapter.

I delivered to you first of all that which I also received: that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures, and that He was buried, and that He rose again the third day according to the Scriptures, and that He was seen by Cephas, then by the twelve. After that He was seen by over five hundred brethren at once, of whom the greater part remain to the present, but some have fallen asleep. After that He was seen by James, then by all the apostles. Then last of all He was seen by me also, as by one born out of due time (1 Cor. 15:3-8).

Note the important detail—the number of witnesses of Christ's resurrection. The risen Lord appeared to Peter (Cephas is the Greek translation of the Aramaic "Peter"—both words mean "[small] rock"). He then appeared to the twelve. Then, before appearing to the other apostles, including St. Paul, we're told that our Lord appeared to over five hundred brothers at once. We know from the Gospels that when our Lord was put on trial, the false witnesses could not agree in their testimonies. That's because it's extremely difficult to coordinate a lie with a lot of people. But the truth needs no coordination. The five hundred-plus witnesses saw what they saw. The fact that their testimonies agree is proof of this.

Next, I would like to take you to Mark 16, the Gospel for Easter Sunday. We read:

Entering the tomb, [the women] saw a young man clothed in a long white robe sitting on the right side; and they were alarmed. But he said to them, "Do not be alarmed. You seek Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He is risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid Him. But go, tell His disciples—and Peter—that He is going before you into Galilee; there you will see Him, as He said to you." (Mark 16:5-7).

Note the details—the young man's robe was not only white, but it was <u>long</u>. Not only was he sitting, but he was on the <u>right</u> side. He explicitly mentions <u>Peter</u> by name. When a person tells a lie, they usually refrain from giving many detail—it's hard to remember who you told what. But when a person is telling the truth—something they witnessed—these kinds of details are natural to remember.

Finally, consider our Lord's appearance to the disciples in the upper room in Luke 24. First, we are told that Christ invites the disciples to touch Him: "Handle Me and see, for a spirit does not have flesh and bones as you see I have" (v. 39). Then, He asks for food and eats it in front of the disciples (vv. 41-42). These details, witnessed by many people, allowed the witnesses to see for sure that this man was the same Christ who was crucified and that He was, indeed, alive in the body.

Ultimately, our faith in Christ will remain a matter of faith until the Last Day when our faith becomes sight. But until then, we can have confidence in the Scriptural witness of our Lord's resurrection because of the number quality of the witnesses. And blessed are we who have not (yet) seen the resurrected Christ, and yet have believed:

Jesus said to him, "Thomas, because you have seen Me, you have believed. Blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed." And truly Jesus did many other signs in the presence of His disciples, which are not written in this book; but these are written that you may believe that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God, and that believing you may have life in His name (John 20:29-31).

Alleluia! Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

Notes from your Deaconess

Dear Brothers and Sisters of LCR,

Last month I only introduced one individual of the saints we remember from the first millennium since our Lord's ascension. This month I will note six different early Christians — three of whom lived during each other's lifetimes around the beginning of the fourth century (two of those mother and son), one in the seventh to eighth century, and two brothers in the ninth century.

- May 2 we remember and thank God for St. Athanasius of Alexandria, as Pastor and Confessor. Born around AD 295, he lived and served in northern Africa Egypt and Libya, and battled the Arian heresy, which asserted that Jesus Christ was not God but instead was created by God. He attended the First Council of Nicaea in AD 325 where this false doctrine was condemned. He also was forced into exile due to various controversies five different times!
- May 11 we give thanks for two brothers, Cyril and Methodius, missionaries who brought the gospel to the Slavic people. Born in Thessalonica in the Byzantine Empire (now that city is in Greece) in the first half of the 800's, they ministered to Slavic people who had moved into the area. In order that this population could well understand the scriptures and participate in liturgical practices, they created an alphabet that suited the Slavonic tongue (often called Cyrillic), and translated scripture and church liturgy into the vernacular for them to use.
- May 21 the Church remembers and gives thanks for Emperor Constantine, Christian Ruler, along with Helena, Mother of Constantine. Born around AD 272, in present-day Serbia, Constantine ruled the Roman Empire from AD 306 to 337. The historian Eusebias related a story that Constantine had a vision which led him to Christianity. In AD 314 he issued the Edict of Milan which pronounced that being a Christian was no longer a crime. He also called together the Council of Nicaea mentioned in the note about St. Athanasius. His mother Helena had embraced the faith before her son did, and spent much energy in supporting construction of church buildings, including in Palestine where Christ had lived before his death, resurrection, and ascension.
- May 25 we rejoice to remember Bede the Venerable, Theologian. Of May's individuals, I knew least about this saint. Born in England around 672, he probably never traveled more than 100 miles from his birthplace. Sent by his parents to a monastery at age 7, he was one of only two monks to survive a plague that swept through the monastery seven years later. He became first a deacon, and then a priest at age 30. He preached, taught, and wrote commentaries as well as poetry and excelled in music, too. He was still working on an English translation of the gospel of John when he died in AD 735 just at the Feast of the Ascension. We sing one Ascension hymn with a text written by him, LSB #493, "A Hymn of Glory Let Us Sing." Take a look!

I plan to hold Saturday women's Bible studies on May 10 and 24. We will continue our journey through the Revelation of Jesus Christ. We meet in room 103 downstairs (entering in the back door). I send an email during the week prior to each Bible study meeting including a Zoom link if you'd prefer to join us that way. We begin around 8:30 a.m. with our time of fellowship, Bible study, and sharing of prayer concerns, trying to wrap up around 10. We'd love to have you join us!

Defending the Faith

Sometimes the Best Defense is a Good Defense

For the last several months, I've been writing about different religions and Christian denominations. This month, I'm returning to the original assignment – Christian Apologetics.

Why Christian apologetics? In studying the evidence for the things we believe, teach and confess, I find support for my faith, especially when I am weak. I also find ways to discuss our Christian faith with non-believers, hoping that I can plant a seed where none was before.

Let's look at one discussion point today - that the mere <u>existence</u> of the Universe is a very strong argument for the existence of God. How can I say that?

Let's start here. The Universe is not infinitely old as some claim. If it were, all of the stars would have used up their fuel and the Universe would be cold, dark and dead.

The fact that the Universe is still here means that the Universe had a beginning. At some point, it came into being.

What was before that? It's hard to even talk rationally about what happened before time existed. It doesn't make any sense.

So back to the Universe. Everything that comes into being has a cause. Therefore, the Universe has a cause. But what was that cause?

As far as science can tell, the Universe came into being about 14.3 billion years ago in an event called the "big bang". At that moment, time, matter and energy came into existence.

That means that the cause of the "big bang" had to be <u>outside</u> of time, not material and infinitely powerful. It also has to be personal, because there had to have been a decision to create, and only a person or a being with agency can make a decision.

Sound like anybody we know?

Here's a way to discuss this with others that seems pretty powerful.

Do you agree that the Universe came into being at the big bang? (most scientists agree on this). If not, you'll have to dig deeper. But if there's agreement, then ask this:

Do you think the cause was "something" or "nothing"? If they say "nothing", ask them two follow up questions: "What do you mean by that?" and then "How did you come to that conclusion?" This will reveal a lot about their presuppositions — and you might even find out that they don't have any.

If they answer "something", ask the same two questions.

Many people form opinions based on things they've heard, without ever thinking them through. The discussion you open with them will be really interesting, but no matter where it goes, I'd leave them with one thought:

Christianity is the best explanation for the way things are.


